As I sit at the keyboard on the afternoon of Monday 12th July, here in England we are expecting our Prime Minister to confirm relaxation of many of the COVID restrictions we have endured in one form or another over the past 15 months. A similar situation is expected in the Nations. The decision is not without risk: COVID cases are rising steeply in many areas and not everyone is vaccinated. Some would advocate further caution; others feel he has been too cautious already. One thing he does not lack is advice! It is his decision, though, and it's bound to be a tough one. We all hope it is the right one.

We are also likely to face momentous decisions both as individuals and as choirs. Certainly, some choirs have been weakened by loss of members (some, sadly, through COVID) and are now very few in number. Many men wonder if they can still sing after so long! A few choirs have kept the flame burning though Zoom rehearsals, as we have seen, and seem in a good position to re-start quickly. Each individual situation is different but in all cases, it has not been possible to sing publicly (even, until recently, in Australia). No-one is sure when bookings might start coming in once more. This is especially true of residential homes where the 'bread and butter' work of many choirs is to be found. This much is certain: we have all missed the personal fellowship when rehearsing, and shared sense of commitment when singing together to God's glory. There really is no substitute, is there?

We may be at a crossroads as a movement. I am in no position to offer advice to those deciding their choir's future. However, when making such decisions, we should always ask ourselves: will the outcome of our proposals be honouring to the Lord, and do we believe them to be in line with His will? God does not stand still; nor should we. As He closes one door, He may open another; He only asks that we be obedient to His calling upon us. If proclaiming His Word in song though Male Voice Praise is still His desire, those doors will open (though we might still need to knock!). If not, we should recognise a closed door for what it is. His redemptive work continues regardless and His Word will not return to Him void. In that we can take great comfort!

Thank you so much to all who have contributed. Please keep in touch regarding your choir's future and plans. I expect the next edition to be in October by which time many, including Council, will have considered the way forward. In the meantime, brethren, "pray without ceasing".
