HIGHLAND GOSPEL MALE VOICE CHOIR

For the first time since the Coronavirus Pandemic, choirs from across Scotland and Northern Ireland gathered to celebrate the 35th Inverness Festival of Male Voice Praise on Saturday 4th June.

More than 200 people of all ages headed to The East Church in the city centre and enjoyed Gospel Praise sung by choirs attending from Northern Ireland, Moray and Peterhead, the Festival being hosted by the Inverness-based Highland Gospel Male Voice Choir.

The free event included a Gospel Message from speaker Kenny Wilson and additional songs and music by guest artists John Alexander Wilson and Friends.

The 60 choirmen were accompanied by pianist Karen Young and led by conductors Eileen Mackintosh from HGMVC, Walter Brown from Peterhead and Houston Ogilby from Ballymena, Northern Ireland.

A collection was raised for local charities Bear Necessities and The Highland Hospice.

The very powerful and well rehearsed sound from the choirs produced an enjoyable, emotional and Spiritually charged evening with an awareness of His Presence being clearly felt.

The Highland Gospel Male Voice Choir is now on a well earned summer break and will resume in August when rehearsals will commence for several events already planned for later in the year.

I was very weak and rather wobbly and in much pain, and it became clear that the recovery was going to take time, especially with more complex surgery. My physiotherapist says I am progressing well but Jean has been told to be strict with me! I am grateful for all the love and concern that has been shown to me by so many.

BRISBANE FESTIVAL MALE VOICE CHOIR

Richard Jeffrey, for whom we asked for prayer in our last report, has progressed well but still has some anxious times with his health. However he has

been able to return to practices and singing at our presentations. Sadly, on the 1st April we attended the memorial service for John Slaughter who had not sung with us for some time because of ill health. He originally joined the choir in about 1986. Later on he shifted to the Blue Mountains in New South Wales and sang for some time with the Sydney choir. He returned to Brisbane and sang with us for quite some years. About twelve choir members attended with a number of our wives. We managed to sing We'll All Be There at the end of the service. This was appreciated very much by the family. A eulogy from Martin Fleming, our previous Chairman for twenty years, was read during the service.

Our presentation at St Matthew's Anglican Church on Palm Sunday had a good attendance. The Minister who was relieving at the time told our conductor he would give us 12 out of 10 for the presentation. On the 11th June we travelled to Burleigh Heads at the Gold Coast. This time there was

again a warm reception but a much smaller audience than previously. However there was at least one sincere inquiry for the Gospel tract we offered. On the 3rd July we are booked for the Living Faith Uniting Church at Carina Heights at 2.30pm. Unfortunately we learnt that our Conductor Robyn Geddes had tested positive for Covid and unable to be there. Peter Dor, who had just commenced as an assistant con-

ductor in the last few months, will now have the responsibility for the whole programme. There are some other presentations in the pipeline and a further number still to be finalised in the latter part of the year.

We thank God for these opportunities and although our numbers have reduced we still have a reasonably balanced group in the low twenties on most occasions.

From here and there

A number of folk have passed away, whose families we can remember in prayer.

In early April the London Area lost one of its long-standing supporters in the person of Beth (Betty) Carter-Samuel, who died aged 96. Her husband Leith Samuel had spoken at several Area engagements and after his death, Beth continued attending events including some outside the Area.

As mentioned earlier, David Roberts passed away on 23rd June. He died peacefully during a short spell in hospital whilst receiving treatment for a blood

clot. David had been leader of the Whitstable Choir for several decades and also had a spell as Pastor of Faversham Gospel Mission. He conducted at several London Festivals and was a regular at the East Kent Festivals. His funeral is to be held at 11am on Tuesday 9th August at Aylesham Baptist Church, with a burial afterwards at Whitstable Cemetery.

We have also heard of the very recent passing of Fred Boulton, a long-standing member of the Bristol and West Area. His funeral will be held at 1pm on July 20th in St George's Church, Wembdon, Bridgwater TA6

7RR followed by a family committal and refreshments for all in the Parish Hall. Fred's son Neil wrote with this recollection:

While at a small Baptist Church near the Airbase in Missouri, the minister had 'volunteered' Fred without his knowledge as a special soloist at a prestigious outreach event! On complaining, Fred was told very firmly that 'you have a wonderful singing voice - use it for the Lord!' Only in the mid sixties was Fred able to comply with that command and found the calling for the rest of his life - Male Voice Praise. Leaving youth work, he joined the Bristol Evangel Male Voice Choir, quickly becoming organising secretary, then assistant conductor. Weekly rehearsals and fortnightly engagements were religiously attended, holidays being planned to fit in spare weeks. Not even the demands of secular employment were allowed to interfere with the rehearsal night! Fred was one of the choir soloists for a number of years and also under-

took solo support for other Christian engagements. Tours to France with the Bristol choir followed in the 1970's (singing phonetic French was an experience...), and later, with the South Wales Choir, a number of tours to Canada and the USA. On moving to Spaxton he led the small Bridgwater Gospel Singers group and over a number of years helped them take services in some of the smaller country chapels, as well as maintaining contact with the Bristol Choir when they were nearby.

Lastly, Andy Dart of the Suffolk Choir has passed on some information regarding his late father, Steve, who passed away in August 2020. Now a group of his work colleagues have got together to raise money for a headstone for him. They are doing a sponsored cycle ride around the area in which they live on 13th August, some two years after Steve's death. This kind gesture shows the esteem in which Steve was, and still is held by his colleagues working with HM Prison Service.
