

A quick review of the 2nd half of 2022. We held Regional Festivals on the Sunshine Coast and Bundaberg (4 hours north of Brisbane) in September and October respectively. It was particularly encouraging for us all to join with the Bundaberg choir and we filled the local venue which made for a great afternoon of corporate praise and proclamation of the Gospel. Having reformed as a choir in August to enable us to sing at the Thanksgiving Service for the life of our late brother James O'Donnell (Jimmy), we decided to continue to meet fortnightly on a Friday afternoon at the church of one of our 2nd Tenors. It was such a pleasure to be meeting regularly again, enjoying the fellowship of our brothers and preparing to sing for the Lord during the Christmas season at our local Care Homes, which we had not visited for three years.

With Covid-19 still at large, we had to follow the specific protocol of each home. We were welcomed back eagerly to seven homes, and we were invited to visit a new Care Home, thanks to the efficiency of the Cheltenham Branch of the "Good News for Everyone!", who paved the way for us; the Manager is a Christian lady. We took lateral flow tests to enter one home and, sadly, had to cancel a visit to one of our favourite establishments. They had insisted we wear masks throughout our visit, which the Activities Co-ordinator agreed was impractical.

We also had to cancel two engagements due to icy, and even foggy weather conditions.

We have lost another of our faithful 2nd Tenors to cancer. Ken Spink was a widower of 92 years of age, who passed away very suddenly. He was at our practice on the Friday afternoon, and was called home the following Sunday morning. Four members of the Choir were able to sing 'We'll All be There', ably assisted by our faithful accompanist, at his funeral service. We are missing Ken very much.
