Onto other news. We celebrated our 33rd annual festival of Gospel praise on 2nd June with visiting choirmen swelling our choir to 54. Following rehearsal, we went out into the city to sing selected pieces which were well received, and after a sumptuous tea and a time of prayer, the Festival opened with a gathering time of community singing. The Festival then was enjoyed by an attendance of 350 and a collection of £1200 was gathered for the Fishermens' Mission. Our guests, the North Ness Boys from the Shetland Isles sang and played a selection of Gospel pieces in their unique coun-

ter's funeral service was held on 14th April at the Waterfront Church in Swansea. The choir didn't sing as Mair felt it might be too difficult for her and the family. All the same, the church was filled with hundreds of folk and the Lord's name was lifted high. It is evident that Peter touched the lives of many people and he will be sadly missed. Please do continue to remember Peter's widow Mair and their sons Mark and Andrew in the days ahead, as well as the Swansea choir in their loss, too.

On a more cheerful note, the Whitstable choir recently held an evening of Praise and Worship at Beltinge Baptist Church, Herne Bay. This was attended by choirmen from Bury and Purley, as well as the Whitstable choir, with John Pease speaking and chairing, and a certain Vaughan Reynolds providing accompaniment and a couple of guest instrumental spots. The small church was well filled and the evening was a time of great blessing, with the Lord's presence being clearly felt.

After the first edition of Choirlink got off to a flying start, when there was barely enough room to fit everything in, this edition is somewhat leaner! In particular, the eagle-eyed among us will notice there isn't any international news. I don't suppose singing has ceased in the southern hemisphere even though it's winter there, so hopefully we shall hear more next time. In particular, the Brisbane Festival is in early September and I know that some of the Sydney men plan to join them.

It's quite evident that many choirs have lost folk recently. Some had sung formerly, and others were still with the choir when the Lord took them. From my perspective in the London and Home Counties Area, I know it can make the going very hard for a choir when they lose someone for whatever reason. It is often very difficult to find new men to replace those who are no longer singing. We should give thanks for those who have sung with us in the past, yet keep our eyes and ears open for potential new members. Most of all, we need to pray that God will provide us with the men we need to continue the work - if this is His direction for us. In London, we feel the work has now ended as regards the annual Festival, but local choirs are still maintaining a witness at smaller venues in nearby areas, though sometimes with unbalanced parts.

The summer period will still be busy as we prepare for our 66th Bristol Festival scheduled with the Lord’s Blessing for Saturday 29th September at St Mi-

chael’s Church Centre, Little Stoke, Bristol. This is the venue to which we moved three years ago with the Colston Hall becoming too big – and expensive! – for us. St Michael’s is a superb modern Anglican Church now seating just under 500 with extremely good facilities suitable for a festival such as ours. For this we will be holding regular rehearsals throughout the summer not forgetting that we will also be attending the Brangwyn Praise at Swansea on 14th July which was cancelled in March due to bad weather.

Our guest speaker this year is Paul Young, an excellent speaker from Maesteg in South Wales and well known to the Swansea Choir. Unusually, we have asked our soloist from last year, Stephanie Lamplough, a Salvationist from Stafford to return to us this year. She was such a wonderful inspiration to us with a superb soprano voice and was so well received that we could do no better other than asking her again along with her three young daughters who won over everyone with their delightful singing.

We usually have a good attendance of men from other areas including Swansea, Exeter, Torquay, Bridgwater, Cheltenham and several regular visitors from the general London Area. Our Festival this year was different.
