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BRISTOL EVANGEL MALE VOICE CHOIR

Regretfully, I missed the deadline for the October 2019 (No. 7) issue through not having made an appropriate diary note and probably because of the timing for arrangements with the Bristol Festival.

Our 67th Festival was held on Saturday 28th September at our new venue in St Michael's Church Centre, Stoke Gifford on the northern outskirts of Bristol which is convenient for motorway travellers as it is only a few miles from the major M4/M5 intersection at

Almondsbury and is also right next door to the Bristol Parkway Railway station. This in turn is convenient for relatively all-day car parking cheap should all the local street parking be utilised and is certainly cheaper than much Bristol City parking charges. This was our fourth Festival at this superb modern venue, and we have no regrets whatsoever in making the decision to move out of the Colston Hall in the city centre.

We were very much encouraged with a choir of 68 men including a large contingent of visiting men from Swansea, Exeter, Torbay, Saltash, Poole,

St Ives, Bolton and Purley. It was also good to welcome a couple of carloads from The White Rose Choir in Castleford including their leader Trevor Jones and Ewart North. It was a privilege to be able to welcome Mike Dewhurst, our Council Secretary, as our guest conductor who readily joined with me and our Bristol Evangel deputy conductor with the conducting responsibilities.

We were able to present the Gospel in a clear manner to a reasonably full church although the numbers were down on last year possibly because of the severe adverse weather conditions. The programme consisted of a typical varied FMVP programme using most pieces from our new repertoire held on the all-encompassing memory sticks as so professionally produced by Alfred Tarring. The two exceptions to this were first class interpretations of "Just a closer walk with Thee" as arranged by Ed Lojeski and the rousing "Praise the Lord, His glories show" set to the stirring welsh tune of Llanfair.

We were let down by our

planned soloist at short notice so I called in the services of a local mixed voice choir, The Emmaus Christian Choir, who certainly rose to the occasion with a steady presentation of six pieces including the well known arrangement of "The Lord's my Shepherd" by Howard Goodall. The Emmaus and assembled Male Voices joined together with a suitable arrangement of Morte Criste which to my mind was very effective.

Our speaker and Chairman, Alan Thorpe, was... well what can I say other than "different" and it really does depend on individual senses of humour as to how well you liked him! Besides being the Pastor of several churches over the years he was primarily the Railway Mission Chaplain for GWR based at Temple Meads Station in Bristol. Although officially retired he continues his work with the Railway Mission. I received various comments about Alan's presentation but be in no doubt that, in between the jokes, we heard the Gospel message that evening. Whatever people may say Alan has been privileged to have led a number of railway employees to the Lord including, during a counselling session, the train driver who had experienced someone jumping in front of his train.

A few weeks later we thoroughly enjoyed a day at Cheltenham helping the choir celebrate their Diamond Jubilee which is reported on elsewhere in this issue.

As unusually we have not had any Christmas engagements, we concluded our year with several regular Sunday evening services in and around our patch ending with an excellent evening at Whiteshill Evangelical Church. This is where we rehearse and the church is known to many FMVP people, including Council and Area Organisers who have attended meetings there. It was a great evening with a good choir performance, a superb piano solo from Norman Philips from Whiteshill ending with a good time of Fellowship with choir colleagues, wives and congregation over a first-class supper provided by the Whiteshill ladies.

We continued to rehearse up to

a week or so before Christmas and are looking to the New Year as we continue in His service especially as we get into the list of pieces as selected for both the Scottish Festival 2021 and this year's Exeter Festival – some interesting items in there which I am sure we will come across several times throughout the coming year.

Greetings to all as we are nearly a month into 2020 and one event of praise under our belts and 9 booked engagements before our annual festival on 6th June, in various locations and for needy charities including the Inverness Street Pastors and Dyke Church which dates back to the time of MacBeth, as the Thane of Cawdor is buried in the oldest part of its foundations.

Now let me tell you of our annual visit to Porterfield Prison. On Monday 18th November we gathered to sing a programme of Gospel hymns to some of the inmates of B hall at the start of Prisoners' week. Twenty of the Choir attended and were well accepted. At the end we received enthusiastic applause and a note, pictured here, was pushed from under a cell door. What a wonderful encouragement for our Choir and may we continue to pray for the writer of that note.



The 19th November saw the Choir singing to Senior Citizens at Inshes Church Inverness. We sung a selection of their favourite pieces such as 'Ye gates' Scottish 53, which we sang *a capella*. Also, we sang the tune Finlandia as requested. At the end we enjoyed fellowship with

our audience over a sumptuous tea.

The Choir also sang in Fortrose Free Church on 6th December for a fund-raising evening to support the building of the new church and a sum over £2,100 was collected.

On the afternoon of Sunday 15th December in Dingwall Auction Mart we gathered to sing at our 22nd annual Christmas service for the Farming Community. A collection was taken for 'Support in Mind', a mental health charity, which amounted to £1,350. Following a time of gathering community singing of carols, the choir of 20 sang from the auction ring a mixture of new carols and choir pieces to an audience of 400+. At the finish we received enthusiastic applause and enjoyed fellowship over tea and cakes.

Mike has written to say that there will be no Bolton Festival in 2020. He sets out the reasons in a letter which I quote from here:

Sadly I am writing to inform you that we have made the decision not to have a Festival in Bolton this year.

Several factors have led us to make this decision, the main one being the lack of support we now seem to get from the local churches resulting in a massive fall in audience numbers. This is together with the rising costs of putting on such an event, the amount of work involved with fewer people to help, and also concerns about the balance and size of choir as many choirmen are now getting older and may not be able to travel to be with us.

Last year we reached our 40th Festival and what a great event that was. Our feeling now is that could never be repeated and we do not want to go down the road of seeing events that fall below the standard we require and are not honouring to the Lord.

As a local choir we intend to maintain our witness in the area and will continue supporting other areas where Festivals are taking place. Therefore we can continue friendships and have fellowship with the many we have known for so many years.

Thank you so much for your support over the years your presence on so many wonderful occasions has been very much appreciated. What great lasting memories we have, and we know that there are those who have come to put their trust in the Lord as we have experienced His presence with us in our work and witness together.

Thanks Mike. This is a sad day but the important thing is that you have made a decision which honours the Lord, and allows the work to continue in a more streamlined way. May He bless you all!

Diamond Jubilee Rally

The Chairman and Speaker was Paul Young, an Evangelist from Maesteg, in the Valleys. The Soloist was Luther Vaughan, from Cardiff, who is a classically trained opera singer. One of the Guest Conductors was John Davies, who leads the Swansea Gospel Male Voice Choir, and the Organist was Paul Willis, who is a Bristol man but now lives in Cardiff and sings in the Cambrensis Christian Choir. The Choirmen came from various choirs around the UK: Bolton, Bristol. Cheltenham, Chesterfield, Exeter, Inverness, Luton, Purley, Swansea, Torbay, and Whitstable. We welcomed three Guest

Conductors: John Davies Paul Davies (Swansea); (Bristol); Alfred Tarring (Exeter); together with our own Leader, Mark Mulley. We were also treated to the keyboard and musical skills of Paul Willis on the organ, and our own maestro. David Tingley on the grand piano. The evening was led superbly by Paul Young, who gave a very good message. Luther Vaughan gave us two good solo spots, accompanied by his own pianist. The result was a very successful evening, which was enjoyed by both Choirmen and visitors alike.
